



BUILDING OUR STRATEGIES FOR

Fiscal Year 2022 was yet another year of building for Kansas City University.

As we emerged from the disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic and returned to closer-to-normal operations, KCU achieved a number of milestones that position the University for even greater accomplishments in the future. From new facilities and academic programs to new leaders and partnering, this Annual Report highlights some of the major achievements of Fiscal Year 2022.

In March 2022, we bosted an official grand opening for our new \$33 million Center for Medical Education Innovation, and by the end of FY22, the College of Dental Medicine (CDM) construction, consisting of three interconnected buildings on the Farber-Meditire Campus in polphin, was on schedule and within budget. The KCU-CDM will provide our dental student doctors with a state-of-the-science educational facility, a leading-edge oral health clinic, and one of the most accomplished teams of dental medicine faculty in the country.

In May 2022, the KCU College of Octopathic Medicine graduated our largest class to date. In addition, the COM added a new DO/MPH dual degree program in partnership with the University of Nebraska Medical Center, futher strengthening our focus on public and population health.

The College of Biosciences graduated its first class of Doctors of Clinical Psychology, all of whom completed a clinical internship. The College also began a new bioinformatics track to prepare our graduate students for carvers in this rapidly growing field of statistical analysts.

Just as every great building project begins with a blueprint, every great university starts with a strategic plan. In FY22, KCU completed our most recent strategic plan: "Redefining Health Sciences Education." This document, outlining the University's goals for the next five years, is our road map to the future.

Our mission remains unchanged: Improving the well-being of the communities we serve. Our vision has been honed to reflect the health care transformation taking place to address the increased expectations of patients and our communities: Changing health care for good. FROM THE PRESIDENT

DEAR FRIENDS,

This year is shaping up to be one of unprecedente growth for OSU Center for Health Sciences and OSU Medicine. With an outstanding leadership team and the commitment from our trusted faculty and staff, I am pleased to report that 2023 is proving to be another record year for our organization.

Inside this year's issue of Vitals, you'll learn how we are making a difference in the lives of our students and the health of Oklahomans across our state. To say we are living up to our mission is an understatement, and I could not be more proud. To that point, in June we learned we were named number one in the nation by U.S. News and World Report for graduates practicing in health professional shortage areas, which underscores our mission of serving rural and underserved communities. OSU-CHS is also the only institution in Oklahoma to have grown enrollment every year for the last decade, led in part by the growth in our Forensics and Health Care Administration programs. Our first Physician Assistant class graduated in October and a new nursing program launched in Stillwater this fall - all demonstrating

significant recent awards related to tribal and rural health. Here in Tulsa, OSU has a lead role in the development of the new Academic Medical District, which includes ongoing planning and construction of the new VA Hospital and also the Oklahoma Psychiatric Care Center, both on track to open by late summer 2025. Along with the planned expansion of the OSU Medical Center, these downtown projects total more than \$600 million - the largest health care development ever for downtown Tulsa.

We are also aggressively pursuing new approaches to telehealth, thanks in part to the boost of \$10 million in ARPA funding. Our goal is to become designated as a Telehealth Center of Excellence, and we are well on our way by delivering specialty care virtually to critical access hospitals across the state. Our state and federal appropriations request will center on this as we identify industry partners and tap into a wide range of population health technologies to deliver more care to Oklahomans If you've not been to campus in a while, please come see us and take a quick tour - you'll be amazed by what is happening here at OSU-CHS. Thank you for your partnership as we work together to impact the lives of Oklahomans.

This past fiscal year also brought in sizable new research funding to OSU-CHS - in the amount

of nearly \$170 million in proposals and \$111 million received. This more than doubles the grants we

received in the previous fiscal year due in part to the award of \$50 million in ARPA funding as well as


